

# President Zelenskyy

President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyy held a meeting with American businessman and philanthropist, founder and executive director of Wasatch Group, Dell Loy Hansen.

The Head of State thanked Hansen for helping Ukrainians, because since the beginning of the full-scale invasion of the Russian Federation into Ukraine, he has been an active participant in charity projects in support of our country.

"I know you implement very important projects to support our people. We really appreciate that you are investing in life, in helping people," Zelenskyy said.

For his part, Hansen said that he admires the leadership of the President of Ukraine and the entire Ukrainian people in protecting the values of freedom and democracy and expressed his belief that support for Ukraine in this struggle must remain unwavering.

Wasatch Group, in partnership with the charity To Ukraine With Love, plans to build 600 fully furnished modular homes in Kyiv region in 2023-2024 for people whose homes were destroyed by the war in Ukraine.

The founder of Wasatch Group also presented to Zelenskyy the project of the multi-apartment residential complex "Hansen's Village," the main idea of which is to create a large community for the elderly, war veterans, widows, orphans and those with disabilities. The project will include centers for medical and emotional care, as well as physical therapy, art therapy and other needed services.

"This village will be able to replace several family-type orphanages destroyed during the war. We know that more than 100 such institutions were destroyed, and First Lady of Ukraine Olena Zelenska is taking care of the issue of their restoration," Hansen said.

He also told the Head of State about the initiative to build residential buildings for homeless elderly people in several regions of Ukraine. A dental clinic, hairdressing and manicure services, a hot food center and a cinema will be provided for the needs of their residents free of charge.

Zelenskyy thanked Hansen for this idea and such important care for the elderly.

The President of Ukraine also discussed with the founder of Wasatch Group the possibility of his company's participation in the construction of new, modern rehabilitation centers for war veterans, which the state will support in every possible way.

#### Life Goes On

When the Kovalenko family had no water, they got their buckets out. "Thank goodness, God gave us some rain," said Oleksandr Kovalenko. The family collected rainwater they relied on for drinking and cooking. Oleksandr's wife Liubov, daughter-in-law Bella, and grandson Sasha evacuated, but he stayed home with his son, also named Oleksandr. Oleksandr junior, perpetually optimistic, remained positive when he connected with his wife Bella. "Everything is always okay with him. He never needs anything," she said. But his father told the story of his son fleeing for safety under such intense shelling that when he dropped his cell phone, he didn't even stop to pick it up.

The Kovalenko home went up in flames, when Oleksandr senior was sleeping inside. The family has lived in the house for 40 years, renovating and fixing it up for a comfortable retirement. Oleksandr junior came home from his shift at the army and found the home burning. Although the home is in ruins, Liobov continues to grow vegetables in the greenhouse. "Life goes on," she said. "Everyone is hungry."

#### "We're Unbreakable"

The evening before the war began, Olena Atamanchuk took a trip to Kyiv with her husband. The full-scale invasion cut her off from the rest of her family, who stayed in Makariv: her 28-year-old daughter Alina, Alina's husband Maksym, and their toddler son David. "I had a premonition that we needed to get our children," said Olena. But it was too late and the family lost contact for several days. "We're alive," were Alina's first words, when she called her mother.

When Olena came back to the ruins of her home, she let out a cry. Four projectiles—or possibly more—struck the Atamanchuk home. Amid the rubble, Olena found a metal stove that survived in the wall that her father built. She was reminded of his words: "We're unbreakable." The new home from To Ukraine With Love is a new start for the family. "You renewed our hope in life," said Olena.

#### Hope to Restore

Before the war, a lush, well-tended garden adorned Valentyna Ishchuk's property: there were strawberries, currant landscaping shrubs, crocus and other early spring flowers. Now the garden is overgrown with weeds. "Looking at this devastation, it's hard to believe how hard we worked on our property and how we could be so in love with it," said Valentyna.

When Valentyna's granddaughter Lina learned about the destruction, she kept the news from her grandparents for a month. She was especially worried about her grandfather Mykola, who had survived three strokes. The youngest of seven children in his family, Mykola was the guardian of family albums and photographs. "I don't care so much about the clothing," Mykola said. "But the family's history was painful to lose." Valentyna looks forward with hope: "We will restore everything. The most important thing is that we're alive and healthy."

### Making a House a Home

When the Russians entered Lypivka, Anna Fainitskyh and her son Volodymr hid in the town's bomb shelter. Her husband Oleksiy went to be with his father who had cancer and was bed-ridden. For a while, it was impossible to leave the bomb shelter as there were blasts on one side and shooting on the other. Oleksiy didn't know where his wife and son were or how they were doing. When Oleksiy's brother came to drop off food for them they were able to pass him a note but after that, they lost all contact. They evacuated to Kolomyia. When they reached the first checkpoint, three armored vehicles emerged and began firing directly at them. There were 15 cars and about five or six of them caught on fire and many people died. Luckily, Anna and Volodymyr made it out safely.

At their new home, the Fainitskyh family looks forward to planting their favorite flowers, building a fence, baking in their new stove, and being together once again.




### No Longer Homeless

Kateryna and Oleh Paliura, both in their 40s, recognized a new intensity in the explosions roaring near their home in the Myrocke village in the Bucha region. On March 2nd, an incendiary shell struck their home. Another one hit the cellar, causing the ceiling of their cellar to collapse. The family rushed out with their two sons Oleksandr, 22 and Ihor, 19, and began making their way toward a relative in the Nemishaieve village.

But as they ran through the garden plots—disheveled, wet, and dirty—they learned that the Russians had already occupied Nemishaieve. Kateryna fell on her knees: "We have nowhere else to go." So strangers in one of the villages along the way took the Paliura family into their cellar for five days and nights.

Identifying as homeless is hard for Oleh's mother Mariya, 67, who'd been working on the house as long as she can remember. But thanks to To Ukraine With Love, the family is no longer homeless. "I can't believe that this gorgeous house sits on our ruins," said Kateryna.


### Fearing the Worst

It was a miracle that Tetyana Korovska, 61, survived. When her home in the village near Bucha started burning, she rushed outside. Her neighbor helped her escape and hide in his cellar. She tried returning to her house, but then she saw four tanks pull up to her property. Two Russian soldiers armed with automatic rifles came into the house. They looked around the house. "Where is your cellar?" they asked. After finding nothing there, they said: "We're not going to bother you."

But Tetyana wasn't the only one who lost her home. Tetyana's daughter Liudmyla and her brother lost their homes, too. All three were situated on one large lot. "Everything we poured into this house over the years was ruined overnight—all our dreams and plans for the future," said Liudmyla. With the new home, the family can work, study, and begin rebuilding their life.

### A Ray of Light

During the air raid sirens, the Berezin family hid in the cellar. The worst part, they said, was waking up every hour at night. "You can't sleep. A week under shelling meant a week without sleep. Your consciousness is foggy and you don't understand anything. You flinch with every rustle, because you think a projectile is coming."

Before the war, the Berezin family home was constantly full with friends and family gathered around the fireplace. But on March 26th, an incendiary projectile struck their home and it caught on fire. Everything was destroyed. The Berezin family are grateful for their new home so they can be together and welcome their grandchild on the way.

### Thrown by the Blast

When the war started Olena went to work at the hospital. The whole day her daughter Olga and granddaughter Alona worried about her. After a night in the cellar, Olga and Alona decided to go to the hospital to be with Olena and find better shelter. It was scary to leave the cellar. While they traveled, they saw bridges blown up and were thrown back by a blast wave. But they knew they needed to keep moving.

They had to leave their animals at the house with the hope that the animals would have enough food and water until the family came back. Olena kept calling and asking neighbors to let the dogs and the cat out. But it was too late. On March 8th, their home burned with their animals in it.

The Yakimenkos lived in a room at the hospital until their dreams came true. With the new house, the family can work, study, and feel the ground under their feet again.

### Nowhere to Go

Volodymyr Fedoseev was hiding in the cellar with a friend during the initial shellings. Volunteer soldiers offered to give them a ride out of Irpin, but they didn't want to leave. They had nowhere to go. Finally, Volodymyr decided to leave on May 13th and the first rocket came on the 17th.

He returned on June 5th to find his home destroyed. Volodymyr lived in a tent on his property until a severe frost came and he had to stay with friends. A new home allows Volovdymyr to stay on his own land with a roof over his head.

She couldn't find her husband Viktor, who had been recovering from a stroke, but she needed to get her son and grandson to safety. On March 3rd, her daughter Olena found her father's body, broken and burned, in front of the nine-story building.

Yevgenia said: "We cried out all our tears. The bombing, the occupation, the fact that we were occupied—it was all happening at the same time. One horrible thing pushed out the other." They buried Viktor on March 3rd under a tree in their yard where he rested until May when they could properly bury him. A new home is a miracle for the Tsychenko family to give them hope to keep living and a chance to properly grieve.




### Popyvnyuk Family

### An Hour Separating Life and Death

Nataliya Popyvniuk and her husband Termasin evacuated Dmytrivka on February 25th, leaving behind her parents and grandmother. As they were leaving, the bridge blew up behind them. Had they left an hour later, they wouldn't have been able to get out. By the time Nataliya returned at the end of April, it was a scene of complete destruction. There was only rubble. They were scared to walk on the property or any forests, for fear of mines.

Nataliya and Termasin expressed their gratitude for their new home saying "We hope you receive God's blessings. Thank you for your big, generous, and open heart oriented toward others and toward Ukraine. Thank you so much!"

### 24 Hours to Safety

Sergii Termasin was born in his home and lived there his entire life before it was destroyed. When the war started, Sergii, his wife, and son Roma stocked up at the supermarket. And then went to our neighbor's basement to seek shelter. By March 5th they decided it was time to flee. It took them 24 hours to drive 250 miles because all roads were clogged up with cars full of people escaping until they finally reached the Rivne region where they stayed for a while.

On March 30th they received a text from Roma's friend that their home was on fire, but no one could stop it because of the heavy fighting going on. "We thank you from the bottom of our hearts. We needed this house so much. We went through such hardships and didn't even know how to go on. You are wonderful people" they said.

They wanted to believe that the Ukrainian soldiers would beat back an attack and that the horror would end in just a few days.

To calm Nikita, Alla's grandson, they told him that the explosions were fireworks. And although airplanes were something Nikita enjoyed as a toddler, he no longer looks to the sky in excitement. He is now afraid of all airplanes and loud noises.

This four-generation family had to split up and evacuate to different places. The only things they were able to take with them was the deed to the house and clothes on their backs. But what good is a deed to a house that has been destroyed? This new home brings the Svet family together again under one roof.

### A Home to Heal

It was getting loud in the Prokhorchuk family's cellar, where 18 children hid from the incessant bombings in Makariv. On March 3rd, when the pedestrian bridge was struck, Valeriy rode his bike to see two large holes, one right next to the other. Finally, the families huddling in the cellar loaded into seven cars to escape the area. "It was horrible," said Valeriy. "We saw dead bodies, people burying children."

For his wife Olesya Prokhorchuk, one tragedy followed another. Olesya lost her first husband a few years ago. Recently, her twin sister died. In winter, she lost her other sister to cancer. Her mother is recovering from a stroke. Olesya couldn't believe the footage from Makariv that showed the destruction of their home. "We had an illusion that it was not our house." But it was. The Prokhorchuk family now has a home to be together and to heal.





When Maria's daughter asked her to evacuate, she answered, "I don't want to leave my motherland. I will not leave my home." When bombs dropped, Maria, who is 62 years old and her husband lhor, 61, ran from the house to the cellar with their dogs. They heard the loud noise of tanks moving down the street and tried to sit quietly.

When Maria's daughter and grandkids, evacuated the car in front of them and the one behind them were blown up by Russian soldiers but they were able to get out alive. When the shooting slowed down, Maria called her daughter who said: "Mom, the Russians said that they will open the last green corridor. Grab your documents. Get out in the clothing you are in right now. Run the way you are now, just run!" They ran under constant bombing to get to the last evacuation bus with one little bag. The very next day their house was blown up. Maria and Ihor believe that God saved their lives and their new home from To Ukraine with Love saved them from being homeless.

When bombs started to fall, Olena and her husband Dmytro hid in the cellar. They took the most needed tools in case the house would fall on them and they had to rescue themselves. Then almost every hour Russian soldiers began to shoot for about 15-20 minutes. Olena said she could set the clock by Russian military attacks. When they decided to evacuate, they had to move quickly on their motorbike under gunfire.

Their son Konstantyn signed up for the military on the first day of the war. Kostia returned home while his parents were still evacuated and saw the destroyed house. He called Olena: "There is no home mom."

But the worst part for parents was being worried about their son. Olena worked and volunteered every day gathering essentials for soldiers and sewing sniper nets. After they lost their house, Olena and Dima lived in a tiny trailer near the destroyed home. When their son came home he had to stay at a hotel since there was no place in the trailer. The house that they received is not only a gift: it symbolizes hope for the future, a desire to live, hope for a better life.

### Not a Dream



When the war started Lidiya and her family couldn't leave since both she and her daughter Olena were sick with COVID. At 7 a.m. on March 5th the roof fell on their heads. Lidiya was bombarded with rubble from the house. Olena and her brother Vasyl ran to help their mom and turn off the gas pipe. Luckily, there was no fire. They were optimistic, ready to do a lot of cleaning and repairing. But all of a sudden they heard the loud noise of the fire truck and people screaming near the fence. They looked around and saw that the house was on fire. Even though they turned off the gas there was still gas remaining in the pipes.

After they came back from evacuation they tried to repair the chicken barn to live in. Although it hasn't been easy, it hasn't stopped Lidiya from going to Kyiv almost every day to teach and giving lessons online. She is a teacher with over 50 years of experience. Her son takes care of animals as a veterinarian and grows flowers. They do everything not to give up, but when gifted a new house Lydiya told us: "I can't believe it. I think this is a dream. Am I dreaming?"

Ivan and Oksana have a small farm. They also care for their son Roman, who had a stroke, and their daughter, who just lost her husband in the war. During the invasion, Ivan created an observation point from one big haystack and gave information to the Ukrainian soldiers about Russian troop movements.

Most of the family's livestock and farm equipment were destroyed by the Russians, making it hard for the family to make money and save the farm. With shrapnel and unexploded mines in their field, Ivan and his son risked their lives to plant their crops: "I walked in front. I told my son that I already lived my life. In case something happened, he would still be alive."

Thanks to the generosity of Dell Loy and Julie Hansen, the family has a home where they can begin to rebuild. If their son successfully graduates from college, the Hansens will provide money for a tractor.

### Gamulets Family

### From Shelter to Shelter

65 year old Galina Gamulets and her husband Nikolai agreed to evacuate Bucha on the 11th of March. They described what it was like when they left saying "It's hard to express how scary it was. When a military jet is flying above your head it's such a loud booming sound that you don't know what to do, where to hide or what can happen. You don't know if the bomb will fall on you or not."



But as soon as they left the border, two Russian tanks blocked the road. Russian soldiers got people out and pushed them to their knees. They stole money and jewelry. Luckily the Gamulets survived and found a shelter where locals provided them with food and a place to stay.

Their daughter Julia had to evacuate in a different direction since she could not get home from work because part of the territory was under occupation already. She had to stay in the bomb shelter for a few weeks, separated from her parents.

As Galina said: "The most horrible thing in life is war, this war. They just came to us, to our home. Came to kill us, just to kill us. It doesn't make any sense in my head until now. How is it possible that humans can do this in the 21st century?" After a year of living in shelters, the Gamulet family could not believe they have a place to call home once again.

### **Inspired to Fight**

As soon as the husband of Olena brought the family to the bombshelter he joined the local territory's military defense unit. As the situation escalated more and more and the explosions started to get louder, on March 7th Olena with her son and parents decided to evacuate Irpin.

At first, they took a car and tried to cross the bridge. But Russians had already taken control of the territory, shooting anyone in their way, including civilians. Olena and her family had to leave their car and walk to Kyiv. They were caught under shelling and kept running with the hope of rescue. Luckily, the Polish press team saw them and picked them up in time.

Olena said they even don't know the date when their house was destroyed. Gifting a house to the Zadorozhni family gives them hope and a place to come back to. As Olena said: "This also inspires my husband, he has more motivation to fight knowing he has a place to return home."

### Ten Years to Build, Only Six to Enjoy

Larisa Ostapchuk is a geography teacher. Her husband Volodymyr is a forestry engineer. They built their house on their own over ten years, but only had six years to enjoy it. Like others, Larisa and her husband heard the first explosions early in the morning. She was still going to go to work. But she couldn't make it because of the traffic jams. On March 5th, amidst constant air raid sirens, they decided to evacuate. At first, just the second floor and roof of their house were destroyed, but they still have hope to repair it. But on March 30th there was a second attack leaving them with no home at all.

Larysa says there are not enough words to express how grateful they are for their new house: "What we have experienced is hard to explain, those terrifying days, we have been so worried until now" she said.

### A War Unimagined

Andriy and Olena Vorobyovy lived together with their son Vitaliy, his wife Ania, and granddaughter Sophia. They sold their property at the capital of the country to move to the countryside.

After the first large explosion that shook everything, Andriy told everyone to fall on the floor in the corridor between the walls. They tried to cover their little granddaughter and daughter-in-law with their bodies.

After the destruction and fire that happened they decided to evacuate. Ania was still breastfeeding her newly born daughter. Friends of the family who evacuated at the same time saw a lot of dead people in the cars on their way, those who tried to evacuate too. For about a month, it wasn't even possible to take away dead bodies and bury people. From the day of evacuation they had to stay with friends or neighbors, still having hope to rebuild one day. But everything was destroyed and burnt, not even one family photo survived. Their dog Bonia died and the other, Jack, had very bad burns.

Andriy still remembers times when the former USSR Government broadcasted propaganda movies on heroism. He could never imagine that there would be war with Russians again.

### **Angels Descended From Heaven**


Svitlana Ivanchenko's family lived in a house she built together with her husband, who passed away. Svilana has a son Oleksiy and daughter Olha, who is a military officer, and two grandchildren, Ilya and Maria. They had to evacuate separately. Olha worried that the family wouldn't have time to evacuate or that something would happen to them during the evacuation. After returning from evacuation in early May, Svitlana was horrified and scared to learn that not just she, but her children and grandchildren, were now without their own roof above their heads. Half of her life was spent building their house or making money to build, and trying to do the best for her children.

But her grandson tries to be optimistic. As he said: "We can replace the material goods. This is just a house. If we had not evacuated but instead stayed at the house, it would have been worse. We are thankful to God that we are alive."

After returning home, they have had to live in separate places. Reuniting the family, a new home is more than just a place to live but an inspiration and hope for a better future.

### **Help from Strangers**

Vira and Ivan Kovalenko have lived in their home since 1970, spending years renovating and adding a second floor. When the Russians entered Irpin, their daughter Lina feared her husband and son, who were at her mother-in-law's house, could be trapped in the cellar. There was no connection so Lina decided to go check on them. What she saw there was horror. There were dead bodies of people in civilian cars, dead bodies of drivers and civilians near buses, cars of those who tried to run away but were shot.

It got harder for the family when they ran out of gas and could no longer heat the house. Ivan had sick lungs and as Lina said "you either could die at home without help or die on your way to evacuation." So they took Ivan in a wheelchair and headed towards any region which was still not occupied. They were lucky to reach the volunteers who helped them cross the Romaniski bridge to safety.

It is hard for the Kovalenkos to believe the generosity of people in another part of the world whom they have never even met. As Vira and Ivan said: "Today we are happy. You know, from the horror we had experienced and now all of a sudden we have a roof above our heads. Now we have a place to live."

This house is not just a gift, it's a chance to finally breathe again.

The wood from the Carpathian mountains keeps the home warm and gives it a fresh and inviting smell of new beginnings.

The Savchenko family is shocked by the generosity of people they have never even met. As Viktoria said "now there is a little piece of America here in Ukraine".





### Forever Ingrained in Our Memories

"Why did our house burn down? Why did this happen to our house?" asked little Carolina when the Kuryata family returned to Borodyanka to see their destroyed home. Her parents, Yana and Andriy tell a story of a lion from Russia coming and taking the house to try to explain the destruction to her in a way that is not so scary.

When the Kuryata family's house was bombed on March 1st, there was no one to help. Their Neighbors wanted to try to put out the fire but the Russian shelling continued and the fire department was already out of service with no electricity or water supply. Eventually, there was nothing left to save.

Yana and Andriy wonder how anyone will be able to move forward and be happy again after everything they have experienced. Loud sounds like fireworks will always bring back horrific memories. "This war will be ingrained in us forever" they said.

### A House of Hope







Homes were destroyed, families were displaced and memories were lost. We are giving hope to families who have list everything.








### **ModulePlus Factory**
